

Liberty Community Services, Inc. (LCS)– Capacity building for housing and employment services


Ryan White Care Continuum providers – HIV services for people living with HIV (PLWH)

#### **Reasons for Unemployment are Complex**

- Low Self-Esteem/Lack of Confidence
- Fear of Losing Benefits
- Limited Skills/Work Histories
- The HIV Community Culture is Shaped by the Early Days of the Virus

<u>Relationships Improve Outcomes –</u> <u>Break Down the Silos</u>

- Need a Community Champion
- The Community WANTS to Collaborate
- Must Provide Tangible Information/ Resources
