- Who: A national non-profit representing public health officials who administer HIV and viral hepatitis programs funded by state and federal governments.
- Where: All 50 U.S. states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, seven local jurisdictions receiving direct funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the U.S. Pacific Islands.
- How: Interpret and influence policies, conduct trainings, offer technical assistance, and provide advocacy mobilization for U.S. health departments.

Project Overview



- Funded by HRSA HAB
- Special Projects of National Significance Part F
- Purpose:
 - Identify, catalog, disseminate, and support the replication of evidence-informed approaches and interventions to engage people living with HIV (PLWH) who are not receiving, or who are at risk of not continuing to receive HIV healthcare.
- Partnership:
 - Collaboration between NASTAD, Northwestern University's Center for Prevention Implementation Methodology, and Howard Brown Health Center
- Three-year project:
 - September 1, 2018 August 31, 2021
 - Extended to August 2022


Identifying Evidence-Informed Approaches

To identify evidence-informed approaches and interventions, CIE:

- Developed an Evidence Rubric
- Interviewed Intervention Developers

- Measured Impact
- Convened an Expert Panel
- Selected Priority Interventions


Literature Review Process

Evidence and Dissemination Expert Panel (EDEP)

- "Impact" refers to the practical impact an intervention can have in improving engagement and retention in HIV care.
- EDEP used experience to rate interventions in the following categories:

Relevance and Reach

Does it impact a significant population of PLWH?

Acceptability

- Will it be accepted by priority populations?
- Will it be accepted by providers?

Appropriateness

• Will it fit into institutional goals and objectives?

Feasibility

• Can it be integrated or readily adapted?

Transferability

Will it achieve similar outcomes in other settings?


Sustainability

 Can methods/outcomes be maintained over time?



Grant Applications and Budgeting



- All CIE Implementation Guides include resources helpful for grant applications:
 - Statistically significant data on intervention outcomes
 - Logic Model
 - SWOT Analysis
 - Staffing requirements
- The Cost Calculator can estimate cost per client, personnel costs, and budgeting for program materials. It can also be used as a budget template.



Garnering Orginzational Buy-In



- Securing the support of leadership, staff, and other relevant stakeholders is an important step when implementing an intervention.
- All CIE Implementation Guides include a section on Securing Buy-In and:
 - Funding Information
 - Staffing Requirements and Considerations
 - Resources Assessment Checklist
 - Promoting Sustainability
 - Overcoming Implementation Challenges



Community Advisory Groups



- Utilize CIE Implementation
 Guides to present intervention
 options to Community Advisory
 Groups and other input bodies.
- Gather feedback on:
 - Feasibility
 - Possible uptake
 - Adaptations needed to meet intersectional needs and to reduce barriers



Inspiration for Program Development



- CIE can serve as motivation for providers to create and evaluate innovative care models.
- While CIE interventions are diverse, one commonality is that they were all developed in response to community needs.
- Assessing your current interventions, staffing, and organizational infrastructure can lead to small improvements that make a big impact (e.g., using existing EMR to enhance linkage programs, centering Peer Navigators, etc.)

Identifying Equity Gaps in Research



- Statistical significance correlates to credibility
- Rigorous evaluation design and criteria excludes under funded organizations and favors academic institutions, hospitals, and other well-funded entities
- Making diverse approaches to working with people with HIV easily accessible for EHE planning

Enhancing Evaluation Capacity for RWHAP Agencies



- Identify programmatic gaps and develop solutions
- Adopt diverse methods of data collection
- Assist with the development of programmatic goals
- Establish sustainable evaluation processes
- Increase dissemination of diverse approaches
